Malcolm, the nicest fellow I have ever encountered! Never a cross word, never a criticism of anyone, and always a smile and always there when needed. When someone needed a hand he was there. When the MPFA started the Trout in the classroom he was there. When the MPFA started the Veterans program he was there. When the MPFA needed someone to cook he was there. When the MPFA needed a president he was there. When the MPFA needed a board member he was there. When the NCCFFF needed a camera man he was there. When the thought of having certified casting instructors came up he was there. I would be willing to bet the list goes on.

How can anyone measure up to this kind of man? If you know let me know I'd like to be more like him.

I had the distinct pleasure of having the most recent fishing outing with Malcolm at Kelsey Bass ranch. Our good friend Al Smatsky had invited us just two weekends ago to participate, we had a wonderful time amidst thundershowers and just plain hot weather catching Largemouth bass. It was truly a memorable but long day. He was the much slower and calm individual when behind the wheel than I am, we joked about leaving for Kelsey to get there at 0-Dark thirty or leaving at 6:30 AM and getting there at 8:00 AM - since he was driving we left at 6:30 AM and while we missed the sunrise bite, we still had a great time – how could you not have a good time when with such great guy?

I again had the pleasure of dining with him and his wonderful wife, Ernie, at the Fly Fishing Festival dinner just before he passed, I only now wished I had not left early to head back up to Truckee, maybe somehow I could have made a difference. Thanks Malcolm, I will miss you a lot!

Malcolm Dunn shared his knowledge and passion with those that sought him out. He was a humble individual, but when asked he was always at the ready to do more than his share. Malcolm felt youth were the missing link in flyfishing and what better way to get them involved than at outdoor shows. He was instrumental with the youth casting at the ISE shows in San Mateo and recruited help from club members throughout the show as he took a personal interest in the Western Outdoors Magazine sponsored booth. Malcolm was also the video guy at the Conclaves recording premiere fly tiers. Doug Fear recognized readily his talent, approached Malcolm for his services. I recall how Bob Clouser and Malcolm made a special connection during the Redding Conclave a couple of years back. Of course, Malcolm was walking on air during the whole event. Malcolm had video taped the Mission Peak monthly fly tiers meeting long before Ray Gauthier stepped up and took over. Malcolm would methodically setup his video camera that he was used for covering professional sporting events as a camera man. During the fly tying Malcolm would tweak the focus throughout the evening until finally Ed Huff had enough, "Malcolm, leave the focus alone!" Who can recall a club picnic without Chef Malcolm working his magic over the barbecue. With the number of folks to feed, it appeared to be a daunting task at times, but Malcolm would always take charge. Not only did he take on these tasks, he was ready to pass along his secrets, and techniques associated with his cooking prowess. I never knew if he was cooking for the gang or putting on a cooking class. Even on his Alaskan forays, Malcolm was always ready to prep fresh caught silvers for the barbecue. I can still recall standing as a hungry casual observer at the ready to pick up a technique and grab any tiny morsel of sashimi that would easily pass through the barbecue grate. It was also a fantastic opportunity to observe him with a knife in hand. Malcolm had taken courses at the Culinary Academy in San Francisco to help him out with the catering side of his life. Malcolm was more than willing to pass along his knowledge.

Malcolm enjoyed pursuing coho salmon until he got into his dorado phase down in Baja's Sea of Cortez. In 2006, Malcolm won the Dorado Tournament and was crowned the "Dorado King" on his very first trip to Mulege with Al Smatsky. We like to begrudgingly think it was beginner's luck, but he earned it, and that title, Dorado King stuck. After that trip, he was no longer interested in catching silvers. He found a new species to have fun with. Al Smatsky or Gene Kaczmarek mentioned recently that Malcolm was excited about heading down to Belize as he worked through his list of fishing pursuits.

Malcolm was a proud father and grandfather. His love of the outdoors definitely rubbed off on his daughter, Angela, as we saw her on one of his Alaska trips. At board meetings, he was looked upon as the wise sage and for his sense of balance. He was active in the Boy Scout Merit Badge program, Vets First, Trout in the Classroom within Mission Peak, but he was also involved with the Northern California Council of Fly Fishing Federation. Malcolm was very active with the Masons in San Francisco. Sometimes he would attend a Masonic meeting in San Francisco and race back to Fremont to attend the club's annual dinner. Double booked one year, Malcolm walked in one night still wearing a black tuxedo. He was late, but he still made a grand entrance and uproar with his evening attire. This was completely out of character from how Malcolm interacted with Mission Peak, not to mention that he was now either over dressed or setting the standard. Some were so taken that a photo was needed, as if there was a need to upgrade the character of the club with Malcolm.

There was a humorous side to Malcolm and he enjoyed a good laugh. Like most of us, he acted younger than his age would otherwise indicate. When the club had rotating board meetings at board member's homes, I was taken by his pot stickers as part of the snacks and drink put out one evening. As the meeting round down, I worked up the nerve to ask Malcolm about his secret technique to making such great pot stickers. To his amusement with a big grin, that patented twinkle in his eye, and trying not to laugh he explained how he purchased them pre-made in the frozen department at Costco. Unable to hold back the laughter, he said there was too much work involved in making them ahead of time. All he had done was reheated them in a skillet. He was glad I enjoyed them though. I was simply crushed.

Yes, he has left too soon.

California golden trout won't be listed as endangered

The official state fish won't receive protection under the Endangered Species Act after a 10-year review of scientific information and conservation programs, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service says.

The California golden trout — the official state fish — will not receive protection under the Endangered Species Act after a 10-year review of scientific information and conservation programs, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced Friday.

"Conservation measures throughout the trout's historic range have done much to protect the species," service spokeswoman Sarah Swenty said in a statement. "In large part because of those measures, the service determined that the intensity of threats does not indicate the species is endangered, or likely to become so in the foreseeable future."

Trout Unlimited filed a petition in 2001 asking the government to list the golden trout, which grows to less than a foot long and is often reddish gold with brilliant orange highlights and blue-gray spots on its belly and fins. Genetically pure strains of California golden trout can be found in just 15 miles of Sierra Nevada high-country streams.

Howard Kern, a spokesman for Trout Unlimited, one of the nation's largest conservation organizations dedicated to the preservation of cold-water fisheries, expressed mixed feelings about the service's decision.

"If there were no collaborative recovery efforts underway, as was the case in 2001, we would be furious," Kern said. "However, we are pleased with all the collaborative activity surrounding this fish right now. If it stalls later, we will absolutely go after the federal government with another petition for listing."

But former Sierra Club president Joe Fontaine, a key figure in getting the 300,000-acre Golden Trout Wilderness near Sequoia National Park designated in 1978, was disappointed. "This species continues to face serious threats to its existence, and livestock grazing is one of them," he said.

Of particular concern is an ongoing dispute over four grazing allotments covering a large tract of the Golden Trout Wilderness. Two of the allotments have been cow-free since federal land managers in 2001 "rested" them for 10 years in order to rehabilitate golden trout habitat threatened by years of grazing and the stocking of non-native trout.

With those prohibitions set to expire this year, Fontaine said, "the golden trout needs all the protection it can get."

The service, however, determined the species is amply safeguarded by measures including a cooperative conservation agreement signed in 2004 between government agencies and private groups, including Trout Unlimited and the Federation of Fly Fishers.

Awarded by MPFA Board of Directors at December board meeting

Requirements: *AMPLIFICATION*

Candidates must:

Have fished 10 or more waters during the calendar year (no private pay to play waters) *This means that the general public have unrestricted access at all times, without any special fees to the waters fished*

Waters may be tributaries of any river or lakes domestic or international *Meaning any named stream, river, or section of river (As in Upper Sacramento R. or Lower Sacramento R. - would be two waters) in any country.*

Used fly fishing tackle only *Simply that!*

Have fished for trout (This is a Trout Bum Award) *Simply that!*
The award generally will go to the person who fly fished for trout in the most public waters

Have reported to the club and shown photos to the club at a regular meeting
Reporting means informing the membership-simple as that - Does not mean that the person must give a slide show presentation, just tell the club where you fished, how you did, what you used - show some pictures.
The purpose of the award is to encourage members to explore, fish as many new waters as they can, tell the membership about the experience there-fore encouraging others to do likewise.

Materials

Hook:	Daiichi 1130 (light wire scud hook), size 12
Head:	3mm plastic pearlescent bead
Tail/shuck:	Grizzly marabou fibers
Rib:	One strand pearl Krystal Flash or brown tying thread (optional)
Abdomen:	Fine tan dubbing
Wing:	Natural deer hair
Hackle:	Grizzly
