# Mission Peak Fly Anglers Board Meeting – November 2, 2010

Vice President Ray Gauthier brought the meeting to order at 7:12 pm. Present were Secretary Dean Lewis, Treasurer Bill Peakes, past President Craig Gittings, Board Members: Malcolm Dunn, Frank Rodriguez, Marilu Sawyer and Stephen Culp. Also present were Carrie Payne, Ken Brunskill, Ed Huff, Gene Kaczmarek and Larry Dennis. President Wayne Culp was out of town.

## Old Business:

- **Elections:** Malcolm reported that Pheo Truong had decided that he couldn't run for a position on the Board and has dropped out. Malcolm indicated a willingness to run again, so the Board accepted him as a replacement on the ballot (November 17 election).
- **Committee Chairs:** Craig has indicated that he wishes to step down as program chair and is willing to work with his replacement. Also, we are looking for someone to replace Don Lee as our historian.
- **Installation Dinner:** The dinner will be held again this year at the "Spin-a-Yarn" on Saturday, January 29, 2011. Price will be the same. If we are guaranteeing 76 people, so we can have the whole dinning room instead of sharing it with others like last year. Please sign up early. Bring your friends.
- **Lost CamCorder:** Several months ago, Harold Whitmore loaned out a JVC EVGLDB 8mm Camcorder to someone at a fly tying night. He can't remember who and would like it returned.

## New Business:

- **Treasure's Report:** Bill gave a report of our current financial situation. The number was close to that reported at the last regular meeting.
- **Project Healing Waters:** This topic took up the majority of the meeting. There have been a number of unfortunate issues with PHWFF and it all came together in a letter from PHWFF, to the club, that was very critical of our operation and was all about how we were not following THEIR procedures and there was nothing about how we have been doing an outstanding job helping the Vets. After a long discussion, regarding the events leading up to the letter, Dean moved and Malcolm seconded that the club withdraw from PHWFF. The Board voted unanimously to do so and to send a letter to PHWFF which the entire Board signed. Our volunteers will continue to work with the Vets as they have been doing, but they will not do it under the umbrella of PHWFF. The President and Chairman of FFF is also very upset by the letter and he may take some steps up and resulting in FFF leaving PHWFF. It is a sad situation.
- **Trout in the Classroom:** Ed Huff gave us an update on developments with the Power Point presentation he has spent considerable time illustrating and developing with input from the rest of the TIC volunteers. Fish and Game wants to distribute copies, some school support outfit in Bakersfield wants to produce 8,000 copies for all the schools in the Central Valley. Also, Northern California Council of FFF wants to put it on their web site, charge a fee for down loading it and split the charge with our club. Dean moved and Malcolm seconded that we send a letter to NCCFFF advising them that they can put it on their web site, but they have to understand that they will have "a non exclusive agreement" and that we will still be able to give it away or sell it ourselves. Motion passed. Ed also asked if he could use the club logo on the "anatomy of a trout" drawings he has prepared. Malcolm moved and Frank seconded he be allowed to do this. Motion passed.

### **Pescadero fish die-off spurs lawsuit threat**

Locals have spent every winter for the past 15 years watching silvery steelhead trout die in Pescadero Marsh. Now they are tired of waiting for state officials to step in and are preparing for a major fight -- in court.

"We're now 15 years in and the problem is still unsolved. When the system is in utter collapse, you don't study that. You take action," said Ronda Azevado Lucas, an attorney representing a group of Pescadero anglers and concerned citizens who are about to file a lawsuit accusing state resources agencies of abdicating their responsibility to protect sensitive fish and amphibians under the California Endangered Species Act.

The group recently launched a nonprofit, the Coastal Alliance for Species Enhancement, to raise money to fix Pescadero Marsh. Recently, it notified California State Parks, California Department of Fish and Game and the California Natural Resources Agency to expect a lawsuit over their "complacency" in the face of evidence that man-made changes to the marsh have resulted in the annual fish kills.

An unknown number of juvenile steelhead suffocate each year in the brackish waters of the marsh when rains force open the sandbar at the mouth of the lagoon and the ocean flows in like a fire hose, mixing layers of freshwater and saltwater. Scientists believe this mixing stirs up toxic hydrogen sulfide and robs the water of oxygen the fish require to breathe.

Time is of the essence for one of the last steelhead runs in San Mateo and Santa Cruz counties. The marsh also hosts the largest population of threatened California red-legged frogs in the state, and the Pescadero group asserts that increasing salinity levels have substantially hurt the frog population as well as the endangered San Francisco garter snake and the tidewater goby.

The endangered Central Coast Coho Salmon disappeared from Pescadero and Butano creeks a few years ago, which feed into the marsh.

"The frogs, the snakes and gobies -- they'll come back. But once the fish are gone, they won't come back. They're extinct," said Steve Simms, a local fisher and a driving force behind the lawsuit.

Everyone acknowledges something went wrong in the 1990s, when State Parks, which owns the marsh, re-engineered the water flow with levees, culverts and water gates. Many of these fixes quickly became defective but were left in place.

Juvenile steelhead grow up feeding in the marsh estuary before going out to sea when the sandbar breaks. Most seasonal lagoons have broken open by now, but this sandbar forms in the fall and remains unbroken until winter. Aquatic plants begin to decompose, which affects dissolved oxygen levels in the water. In 1995, locals witnessed the first steelhead die-off.

This lawsuit will attempt to tie the actions 15 years ago to the California Endangered Species Act. It focuses on the Coho salmon and the San Francisco garter snake, since they are state-protected species.

Lucas, the lawyer for the group, said state agencies have the power to enforce the Endangered Species Act.

"I really think this is about trying to let a sister agency off the hook. If it were a private citizen who owned this marsh, someone would very likely be in jail or definitely facing a cease-and-desist order," Lucas said.

Internal correspondence obtained by the legal team through the Freedom of Information Act shows that the Fish and Wildlife Service, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and Department of Fish and Game officials agree that they would like to restore Pescadero Marsh to a freshwater lagoon system, but they are stymied by a difference of opinion with State Parks.

"We want to make sure our agencies are on the same page. They're welcome from my perspective to propose something. I'd love to hear a proposal from them," said Krissy Atkinson, an environmental scientist with Fish and Game.

**FLY FISHING AIDS AND REMEDIES**  
**EFFECTIVE PRESENTATION FOR WET FLIES, PART III OF III**  
**LIMITATIONS: THE UNSEEN FLY**

Your greatest weakness or limitation during a wet fly presentation with a dry line lies is the invisibility of the fly along its course. You have only a general notion of the fly's location, so you must guess how close it is to any fish in the area, how deep, drag or not, and whether it lures or spooks fish.

In a way, you can compensate and gain some accuracy and/or realize distance by keeping track of the number of line-pulls from the reel on each cast. Any roll, rise or boil near the leader can thus be registered in your mind as so many pulls out (distance). Moreover, concentrating on the fly and its surroundings can help to indicate when to change fly pattern or tippet size, especially when a swirl is seen nearby. A trout might have been attracted to the fly but refused after closer scrutiny, either seeing it as the fraud it is or the repugnance of the oversize line fastened to it.

Sometimes, circumstances can signal when to exercise greater powers of observation. For example, one October afternoon on the Madison River, below its junction, I hooked and released six rainbows in the 18-20 inch size category in six consecutive casts. This led me to observe more carefully. After several minutes of detailed gazing into the stream bottom across the way, I made out the form of what appeared to be a ledge 80-90 feet away. For a better look, I crossed over about 100 feet downstream, climbed the bank, and walked stealthily in the direction of the ledge. What I saw was actually two large tree trunks lying side by side, parallel to the stream flow. They were surrounded by a large school of rainbows. It was then that I realized that even with close examination from the opposite side, one can only see a vague outline of the prolific holding area.

Make use of any bumps you get, for it may be a trout that is not yet prepared to go all out for your fly; also, your tippet size or fly may need changing. The tail may be a bit too long and nipped inadvertently; the fish is "telling you" to shorten the tail. Nevertheless, the bump revealed the precise location of the fish on your measuring tape of line-pulls.

Most of the time, the trout are smack down on the bottom; getting down there is extremely difficult without lead. However, since mending helps sink the fly, the formidable back-mend, which is designed to deliver the mended line portion directly behind the fly and into its same water lane, is most useful for gaining greater depths. Begin by casting upstream and across, somewhat above the target, with the idea to have the fly eventually sink down to the target's level. Back-mend a few times or more until you feel that your fly will hit the mark. Now, during this vigorous mending process, the fly might be disturbed and jerked violently about, but no matter, because the fly has not yet reached the target. However, just before arrival, not only avoid drag or undue turbulence but continue on smoothly with your effective presentation. Incidentally, a longer leader, say at least 12 feet, would contribute to increased depth.

On the reverse side of the presentation coin are many misgivings that tend to spook fish, especially in shallow open water. Anything trout see that is unnatural to his environment may cause alarm and a sudden dash to safety. Wearing bright clothes and hat seems innocent enough but is a no-no. Sloppy or noisy wading is also very disturbing to trout downstream. Indiscriminant casting may lure a nearby brown trout. Even the abrupt lifting of the fly line for the next cast can cause a follow or would-be taker to turn tail. It is necessary to take strict precautions to wade stealthily and steadily, avoiding sudden and impetuous movements. In the foregoing, it was pointed out that the limitations caused by the unseen fly created problems for the fisherman and answers must be found. Therefore, it was emphasized that the would-be successful angler concentrate on the fly, observe its surroundings, and spot tell-tale signs. In addition, it was desirable to manipulate the fly line to help continue the fly on its normal L-shaped path, to present a drag-free fly with a broadside view to the fish, and to cover, in an inconspicuous manner, a substantial area of chosen water. Consequently, it behooves the savvy angler to understand the sightings revealed by observation and concentration and know when and how to react to them.

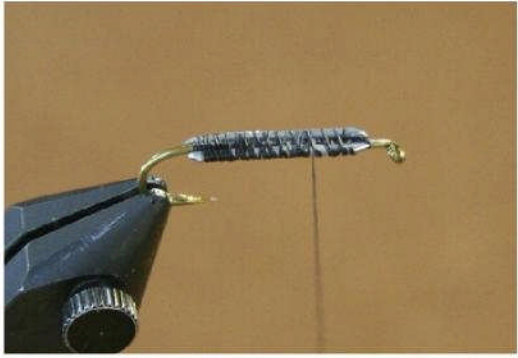

## Mitch Matsumoto's Golden Stone Fly



Prepare hook by heating the center of the shank. Cover shank with one layer of 3/0 thread. Attach .035 lead strips or wrap shank with .020 lead wire. Wrap well and cement.



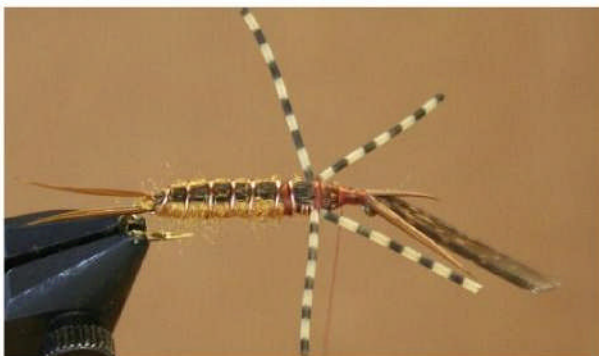
Attach 6/0 or 8/0 brown thread and attach gold wire and gold yarn at bend of hook.



Prepare turkey quill by stripping off a 1/4" section and trimming the tip square. Attach the quill to the top of the hook at the rear, shiny side up.



Add 2 brown goose biots to the rear of the hook to form the tail. Wrap the yarn up to just past the mid point of the shank. Now pull the turkey quill section up between the biots and over the body and tie off, do not trim. Wrap the wire forward to the end of the body and tie off. Continue wrapping the quill down to the eye of the hook.



Tie in two more goose biots near the eye to form the antennae. Cut 2 sections of rubber legs approximately twice as long as the body section. Position the rubber legs about 1/3 back from the eye and tie in the center with 4 or 5 snug wraps. Now grasp the legs on one side and pull down to center the legs on the side. Repeat with the other side.

Using natural hare's ear dubbing, dub a thorax around the junction of the legs.



Form eyes by heating a length of 40# mono. Attach the eyes approx 1 eye length back from the eye of the hook.



Using the yarn used to form the body, tie in behind the eyes and form the head by wrapping in front and behind the eyes. Tie off behind the eyes. Fold the turkey feather section between the biots and back over the eyes and head. Tie off behind the eyes to form the wing case. Trim the turkey feather above the end of the thorax. Bend the shank of the hook by grasping the shnk with the thumbs and forefingers and bending down slightly.
